SABBATICAL LEAVE



As part of our congregation's new sabbatical policy, I am both excited and thankful to be away for a part of this summer. While away, I will be attending a continuing education conference in Minnesota, practicing new spiritual disciplines and working with a career coach.

Additionally, I will be spending some time with my family as we travel to Colorado, Texas and Florida taking in God's creation. Please pray that God would use this time to rejuvenate me for further ministry at Community Church at Tellico Village. I look forward to being back with you on August 9th. Below is an overview of our Sabbatical Leave Policy if you would like to know more.

Policy Overview

Pastor Devin began his Sabbatical Leave Sunday, June 20th. This opportunity was made possible through the *Sabbatical Leave Policy* approved by the Council on January 28th and funded through the church budget.

What is a sabbatical? A sabbatical is an extended period of rest, rejuvenation, and reconnection with God and with family, and it is considered a "best practice" in healthy congregations. It is also one of the most effective ways for a pastor and a congregation to maintain a long-term relationship as it assists in the prevention of pastor burn-out.

Who qualifies for Sabbatical Leave? Our full-time pastors will be eligible for a Sabbatical Leave after 5 years of continuous employment and every 5 years thereafter. The Senior Pastor will be eligible for a 3-month Sabbatical Leave while the Associate Pastors are eligible for 6 consecutive weeks of leave. Any pastor may defer his/her earned Sabbatical Leave.

Who benefits from the Sabbatical Leave Policy? Our pastors need time to develop a greater intimacy with God and rediscover that ministry is about grace, not just works. Our congregation will gain a new appreciation for the pastor, recognizing the multiple responsibilities, tasks and assignments in which their pastor has been engaged. The church will also benefit from the educational experiences pastors participate in and their spiritual renewal upon return. Sabbaticals also help in the retention of pastors.

Who will take over the duties of the pastor on Sabbatical Leave? We are blessed with a gifted team of pastors and council members who will ensure that our ministries run smoothly and effectively. Church functions will continue, and our talented church staff will continue to serve us in the day-to-day operations of our growing, healthy church.

How can I best support our pastors & church during a Sabbatical Leave? Firstly, recognize that the church is not the pastor. Our church does not belong to our Pastors, it belongs to Jesus. In fact, the Bible calls the church His bride which means he loves it more than any pastor ever could. So, recognize that your place in this church goes far deeper than the leadership of a single pastor.

Secondly, try to lean in, not out. It's very normal for some of you to think this would be a great time for you to take a break from ministry in either attendance, giving or volunteering. Our hope is that this won't be the case for you. The church is a body that needs all of its parts doing what they do best. Our church needs you and we hope that you take this opportunity to engage even deeper in our church and find new ways to call this place your home.

Finally, pray for Devin and his family. Though there are many great things about spending an extended period in this way, it can also be challenging. Specifically ask for safe travels and for his leadership to be renewed so that the church may benefit from what God is doing in and through him upon his return.

THE “FRIENDLY FACTOR”



In 2003, while pursuing my Doctorate degree, I was privileged to make a new friend. He was a classmate of mine named Cary. Cary was a local pastor, and because we lived near one another, we shared the commute to North Carolina from the Atlanta area. Cary is from Oklahoma and a cowboy at heart. On more than one occasion, Cary even wore his cowboy hat, blue jeans, and a belt buckle as big as a salad plate. Walking around the small town of Boiling Springs my new friend greeted each person we encountered with a warm and sometimes boisterous “howdy”. Whether they wanted him to or not, he greeted them! After noticing this over the course of a few days I asked him about his penchant for greeting every single person. Cary then explained to me that it was a test of sorts, a “friendly factor” measure intended to gauge the friendliness of a town, region, or state. He said he had rarely been to North Carolina, but that if Boiling Springs was any indication, then the state would rate pretty high on his “friendly factor” scale. Admittedly, I often think of Cary’s “friendly factor” and his boisterous “howdy” when I meet others on the sidewalk or street.

As the “busy season” in our community approaches and as folks are feeling more comfortable attending larger gatherings, we have already begun to see more and more guests joining us for worship. We need to be mindful of the CCTV “friendly factor.” Don’t get me wrong, we ARE a friendly congregation. But I want to contend with you that there is a big difference between “*having friends*” at church and “*being a friend*” at church. Yours just might be the first face someone sees as they walk into our church.

So, just as a reminder, I want to encourage each of us to employ the following practices:

1. Smile (people can see your teeth now that masks are gone!)
2. Offer a greeting or a handshake. (if you and the person you are greeting are comfortable doing so)
3. Consider offering an invitation to guests to sit with you, to attend a community group, or perhaps share a meal together.
4. Engage in conversation, get to know the person you are speaking with.
5. Please wear your name tag.

These first impressions are extremely important not only to those visiting our church but also to those visiting our community.

The Apostle Paul said in Second Corinthians 5:20, “*We are therefore Christ’s ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us.*” As we serve our church and the broader community, may we always be guilty of excessive friendliness, opening ourselves to others as we welcome them into our lives and into our community of faith.

A WELL-KEPT SECRET – THE CHURCH LIBRARY

- When returning a book, just place it in the drawer on top of the card catalog by the door.





SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS


Scholarship Sunday was held on June 27 and several students gave a small presentation which can be viewed at tellico-church.com/watch. Some students that were not present sent in the following information.



HOPE—JESUS IS AN ANCHOR FIRM AND SECURE

Many of us at the Community church are familiar with boating. Living in Tellico Lake, we have been on boat rides or own a boat. Using an anchor in boating helps the boat not drift or go astray. This is helpful when rafting off to swim in the lake. Nobody wants to go swimming after the boat or have the boat run into something like a dock or another boat causing possible damage.


The saying “God is my anchor” is familiar to many of us. We have heard this in sermons and definitely in scripture. Hebrews 6:18b



-19a “We who have fled to take hold of the hope set before us may be greatly encouraged. We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure.”



In Stephen Ministry Leadership Training, we have learned that the anchor not only gives us security but it also gives us hope. The common anchor symbol is what most of us are familiar with. The realistic anchor drawing, shows how the bottom curved part is set at a right angle to the bar at the top. This allows the anchor to dig into the mud/sea bottom without getting stuck. Also notice that the top part strongly resembles a cross.



Jesus’ sacrifice on the cross gives us hope and he is our anchor. We know one day we will be with him in heaven. However, our life is not always easy but through Jesus, he will be with us facing those challenges. In the meantime, if we have lost our hope, God does work through others to help them while they are hurting. One of those groups is Stephen Ministry. - *Medicine bottles: Only the orange colored bottles with lids on them are being collected.
- If you bring your items to church in a bag, please sort the items and place them in the appropriate basket.
- Please only donate the items that are requested. **NOTE: We no longer collect the Boxtops for Education or Campbell's labels/proofs.**
- For those people who pick up the donated items for one of the agencies, please try to clear out the basket(s) on a regular basis. If you are unable to do so, please ask someone to do it in your place.

The Wishing Well Care and Share Collection Area is located under the grand staircase.

FINANCE NEWS

With the generous support of this community over the past two years, we have been able to donate more than \$417,000 to a variety of organizations that will benefit our immediate community, as well as those in need across the country and world.

These funds can be broken down as follows:

- Special Collections, - \$186,322
- Annual Donations, - \$176,758
- Endowments - \$19,000
- Designated Gifts - \$8,749

Also, the Crafters contributed \$26,400 in 2019 but due to COVID had to cancel their activities for 2020.

Over the past two years, \$311,516 of these funds have gone to many local charities such as: The Good Samaritan Center of Loudon County, The Good Shepherd Center of Monroe County, The Child Advocacy Center, Loudon County Habitat for Humanity, and Iva's Place. Other giving includes: \$66,983 in scholarships to local students, \$20,359 to international organizations and \$19,000 for domestic disaster relief.

Our goal has been 11% of our expenditures, not including our mortgage, would be spent on mission giving. In 2020, we exceeded that goal by 2.55%, spending 13.55% in this area. Due to your continued generosity and the success of our 2021 stewardship drive, we are on track to continue this commitment in the future.

The amounts listed only include direct dollars distributed and do not consider activities such as the spaghetti dinner supplies given to Vonore Elementary families, food drives for Good Shepherd, our mittens and caps collection, and the generous Christmas gifts for over 200 foster children. Also, it does not account for the invaluable amount of volunteer hours provided by our members.

Through our work as a community, along with the Holy Spirit, we are truly making an impact in the East Tennessee community as well as across the world. Thank you for your support!
