

This is for ALL that made it work !


## FINANCE NEWS

Have you notice the brighter clearer reception of the weekly on-line worship services the last few weeks? This is due to the new camera system replacing the previous 10-year-old system. This system has a much higher resolution with a greater pixel count. During this pandemic and worshipping on-line, this is a much-needed upgrade.

Another major upgrade that will be starting at the end of February is converting the lighting in the main sanctuary to LED lights. Currently several of the older lamps are burnt out, with many more on the way out as evidenced by their color change. Changing the fixtures is required to accept these new LED bulbs. This will not only reduce the monthly electric bill but will also increase the life of each bulb from 10 years to 20 years. Sunday services will be moved to the Founders Chapel for a couple weeks while the work is completed. While the major expense involved to replace these bulbs was not anticipated we had building reserve funds to cover this upgrade and it will end up being a major improvement in our on-line worship service also.


